

Genesis 9-17 Bible Study

Objective: This study guide is designed to explore Genesis chapters 9-17 through the interdisciplinary approach of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics, and Social Studies (STEAMS). This method encourages a holistic understanding of the scripture, connecting it with various fields of knowledge and a deep understanding of context.

Key Components

Science (S): The Significance of the Rainbow and Natural Resources

- ❖ **Topic:**
Explore the scientific and spiritual significance of the rainbow as a sign of God's covenant with Noah (Genesis 9:12-17) and the natural resources that are prominent in the promised land.
- ❖ **Project:**
Rainbow Significance Project: Discuss how the rainbow serves as a symbol of God's promise to humanity, and reflect on its ongoing spiritual significance.

Technology (T): Tools and Technologies of Early Nomadic Life

- ❖ **Topic:**
Explore the tools and technologies mentioned or implied, particularly those used in construction, agriculture, and nomadic life.
- ❖ **Projects:**
Agricultural Innovations: Explore the agricultural practices mentioned in Genesis 9:20, 12: 7, 12:16, 13:6, 13: 10-11, focusing on how Abraham managed flocks and herds, viticulture, animal husbandry, land management, water management, and altar building (landmarking). Compare these ancient practices with modern techniques, and

<p>Engineering (E): Construction of Altars and Settlement Patterns</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Examine the engineering and construction methods used in the creation of altars by the patriarchs and the settlement patterns that emerged in Genesis 9-17. ❖ Projects: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Altar Construction Model: Develop a model or diagram of the altars built by Noah (Genesis 8:20) and Abraham (Genesis 12:7-8, 13:18). Discuss the materials used and the significance of these structures in worship and covenant-making. Settlement Pattern Study: Analyze the settlement patterns of the patriarchs, such as the locations chosen by Abraham in Genesis 12-13. Create a map that traces these movements and settlements, and discuss the factors that influenced these decisions, such as access to water, pastureland, and trade routes.

<p>Mathematics (M): Genealogies and the Multiplication of Descendants</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Explore the genealogies and the multiplication of Abraham’s descendants as described in Genesis 9-17, focusing on the mathematical implications of these promises. ❖ Projects: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Genealogy Chart: Create a detailed genealogy chart that tracks the descendants of Noah and Abraham. Include the number of generations and descendants mentioned, and discuss the significance of these lineages in fulfilling God’s promise to multiply Abraham’s seed. Population Growth Model: Develop a mathematical model to illustrate the potential population growth from Abraham’s descendants, considering the promises made in Genesis 15:5. Compare these figures with the growth of other ancient populations, and discuss how these numbers reflect the fulfillment of God’s covenant.

Social Studies (SS): Cultural Context of Covenants

- ❖ **Topic:**
Examine the historical and cultural backdrop of Genesis 9-25, including the social dynamics, genealogies, and the significance of covenants in ancient societies.
- ❖ **Projects:**
 - Genealogy and Migration Map:** Create a detailed map showing the migration and settlement patterns of the descendants of Noah and Abraham. Include a timeline and explore how these genealogies influenced the development of different cultures and nations.
 - Cultural Significance of Covenants:** Research the concept of covenants in ancient Near Eastern cultures. Compare the biblical covenants with similar agreements or treaties from other ancient civilizations and discuss their impact on social and political structures.
