

Genesis 36-50 Bible Study

Objective: This study guide explores Genesis chapters 36-50 through the interdisciplinary approach of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics, and Social Studies (STEAMS). By connecting the biblical narrative with various academic disciplines, participants will gain a deeper understanding of Joseph's story and the fulfillment of God's promises to the patriarchs.

Key Components

Science (S): Natural Events and Their Impact

- ❖ **Topic:**
Examine the natural events mentioned in Genesis 36-50, particularly the seven years of abundance followed by seven years of famine, and how these events impacted the lives of Joseph, his family, and Egypt.
- ❖ **Projects:**
 - Famine and Agricultural Science:** Study the agricultural practices and environmental factors that could lead to years of abundance followed by years of famine, as described in Genesis 41:25-32. Research historical famines and compare them to the biblical account, discussing the science behind crop cycles, soil fertility, and climate conditions.
 - Environmental Impact Analysis:** Analyze how natural events such as famine affect societies, economies, and migration patterns. Create a report or presentation that explores the impact of famine on Egypt and surrounding regions, and how Joseph's

<p>Technology (T): Innovations in Agriculture and Administration</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Explore the tools and technologies implied in Genesis 36-50, focusing on innovations in agriculture, food storage, and administrative techniques used by Joseph to manage Egypt’s resources. ❖ Project: Agricultural and Storage Techniques: Investigate the methods used by Joseph to store grain during the seven years of abundance (Genesis 41:48-49). Research ancient grain storage techniques, such as silos and granaries, and compare them to modern methods. Create a model or diagram that illustrates how these technologies were essential for survival during the famine.
<p>Engineering (E): Construction and Logistics in Crisis Management</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Examine the engineering challenges and logistics involved in building infrastructure and managing resources during times of crisis, as demonstrated in Genesis 36-50. ❖ Projects: Settlement Design Project: Design a blueprint of the storage facilities Joseph might have used to store the surplus grain in Egypt. Discuss the engineering principles involved in constructing large-scale storage facilities and the logistics of distributing food to a nation during a prolonged famine. Logistical Planning: Explore the logistical challenges of transporting and distributing food to a large population during a famine. Create an

	<p>example strategic plan that shows how Joseph might have organized the distribution of resources, considering factors such as transportation, storage, and equitable distribution.</p>
<p>Arts (A): Creative Interpretation of Joseph's Journey</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Interpret the themes of dreams, providence, and reconciliation in Joseph's story. ❖ Projects: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Joseph's Dreams Art Project: Create a visual art piece that represents Joseph's dreams as described in Genesis 37:5-11 and their fulfillment in Genesis 42-45. Use painting, drawing, or digital art to depict the symbolic and prophetic nature of these dreams, and their significance in the unfolding of God's plan. Literary Reflection on Reconciliation: Write a poem, song, or narrative that explores the themes of forgiveness and reconciliation in the story of Joseph and his brothers (Genesis 45:1-15). Reflect on how these themes are relevant today and how they resonate with personal experiences of healing and restored relationships.

Develop a mathematical model that tracks the population growth of the Israelites in Egypt, considering the blessings of multiplication and the eventual fulfillment of God's promise to Abraham regarding his descendants.
<p>Social Studies (SS): Cultural and Ethical Context of Leadership</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Topic: Examine the cultural, ethical, and social dynamics in Genesis 36-50, focusing on Joseph's leadership in Egypt and the integration of Jacob's family into Egyptian society. ❖ Projects: Leadership and Ethics Study: Research the ethical dilemmas faced by Joseph as a leader, such as the decision to forgive his brothers and the administration of resources during a time of crisis. Create a discussion guide that examines Joseph's leadership qualities and the ethical principles he demonstrated, comparing them to modern leadership standards. Cultural Integration Project: Study the cultural integration of Jacob's family into Egyptian society (Genesis 47:1-12). Explore the social and political implications of this integration, including how Joseph balanced his Hebrew identity with his role in the Egyptian government. Develop a report

	that analyzes the dynamics of cultural assimilation and identity preservation.
